


A&S Spotlight - Scribes and Scrolls

Some of the most talented and hardest working artists in the SCA are the scribes and wordsmiths who volunteer to create the beautiful scrolls presented to individuals upon an award, honor, or entry to an order. Each scroll takes many hours of work and costly donated supplies to make. Scrolls are created with a variety of materials and artistic methods, not only calligraphy and illumination, but also embroidery, stained glass, and more. An Introduction to SCA Orders, Awards, and Honors - Rowen Cloteworthy

There are, roughly speaking, three types of recognition in the SCA, at both the Kingdom and Baronial levels. There are Orders, there are Awards, and there are Honors. However, people usually just say, “I got X award”, even though it might be admittance to an Order. Since almost everyone calls everything an award, that can make it a bit harder to figure out what is happening if you are new.

An **Order** is a recognition that can be given only once to an individual. In Bhakail, we have several Orders. For example, there’s the Order of the Horse, our entry-level recognition for service to the Barony. There’s the Order of the Salamander for exceptional and longer-term service to the Barony. There’s the Order of the Pasgarde for excellence in armored combat and the Order of the Harlequin for Arts & Sciences. We have a number of other Orders, all of which can be found by visiting this page on the Baronial website:



By long-standing custom, before the Baronial Seat gives someone a Horse or a Salamander, they are supposed to first discuss the individual with the Order at a meeting and consider the Order’s input. In other words, these are what are called a **Polled Order**, meaning the current holders of the recognition are asked their thoughts on someone’s acceptability to join their Order. The Baronial Seat - or the Crown, for Kingdom Polling Orders - doesn’t have to follow the Order’s input, but they do have to ask for it first. Unpolled Orders can be given without asking for input.

The Kingdom also has Orders. Two sets are Polling Orders - the Peerage Orders (Chivalry, Laurel, Pelican, Rose, and Defense) and Orders of High Merit (Golden Lance of the East, Golden Mantle, Golden Rapier, Maunch, Sagittarius, Silver Crescent, and Tygers Combattant). There are also many unpolled Orders. You can read about all the East Kingdom

recognitions by visiting the East Kingdom Seneschal’s documents webpage, then clicking on “East Kingdom Law”. Descriptions of recognitions begin on page 26 of this document.



You’ll see occasional posts that “Polls are due!” This means that the Crown has sent around a list of people who have been recommended for a Polled Order, and people in that Order have until the deadline to submit their comments.

An **Award** is a recognition that can be received more than once. Bhakail has one award, the Flame. It is a token given out for any act of service the Baronial Seat feels deserves it. The Kingdom, also, has several Awards, such as the Burdened Tyger for running or participating in running an exceptional event, or the Golden Lyre for an exceptional A&S piece. EK Awards start on page 30 in EK Law at the above QR code and link

Lastly, there are what precedence heralds call **Honors**. These are usually titles bestowed by the Crown or the Baronial Seat and are usually temporary. Champions fall into this category, as do Court Appointments. For example, there are the Champion-at-Arms for armored combat or the Rapier Champion, each who serves a pre-defined term. For Bhakail, we also have Honors like Baronial Brewmaster or Admiral of the Bhakail Navy, who serve as long as the Baronial Seat wishes. Bhakail’s Champions and Court Appointments are found on the website under “About the Barony”. Kingdom Court Appointments and Champions are in EK Law on page 14.



ACROSS:

2. Type of simple bow made from a single piece of wood. In many parts of the world including much of Africa, the Americas, northern Europe, and Southern Asia, the great majority of traditional bows are this type. The Stellmoor and Holmegaard artifacts of Northern Europe are this type of bow. The Stellmoor artifact was made from the heartwood of a Scots pine while the oldest Holmegaard artifacts were carved from small-diameter elms.
3. The end of the arrow that slots onto the string. It helps keep the arrow correctly rotated, keeps the arrow from slipping sideways during the draw or after the release, and helps maximize the arrow's energy by helping an archer place the arrow at the fastest-moving place on the bowstring.
5. Traditional bow made from layers of horn, wood, and sinew laminated together. Stores more energy when drawn than solid wood of the same length. A recurve version was the standard weapon for Roman imperial archers and has been found as far north as the Antonine Wall in Scotland.
6. Artisan who makes arrows by hand, from the French word "flèche", meaning "arrow".
7. Short, rigid point arrowhead with a small cross-section. Originally made of unhardened iron. Research has found no hardened versions, so it is likely that it was first designed either to extend range or as a cheaper and simpler alternative to the broadhead.
8. Unsharpened arrowheads occasionally used for target shooting or stunning birds and small animals.
10. Cave site in Southern Africa with the oldest known evidence of a bow and arrow, with arrowheads dating from approximately 72,000-60,000 years ago.
13. Tall self bow with relatively narrow circular or D-shaped limbs, not significantly recurved, and frequently made of solid yew wood. Made famous by the English in the Hundred Years War, one example was found in a peat bog in Somerset, dated 2700-2600 BCE.

14. Site in Denmark with the oldest extant bows still in one piece, made of elm, and dated to 8,000 years ago.

15. Type of bow where the limbs curve away from the archer at the ends when unstrung. Found among the Mongols, Romans, Persians, Greeks, Chinese, and Indigenous North Americans, among others.

DOWN:

1. Multiple fin-like stabilizers at the end of the arrow, often made of feather from goose or turkey. The feathers on any one arrow must come from the same wing of the bird, the most common being the right-wing flight feathers of turkeys. The slight cupping of natural feathers requires them to be fletched with a right-twist for right wing, a left-twist for left wing.
4. The primary structure of an arrow or bolt made of strong, lightweight wood, bamboo, or reed.
5. A weapon consisting of a bow-like assembly mounted horizontally on a frame, which is hand-held in a similar fashion to the stock of a long firearm. The earliest known versions were invented in the first millennium BC, not later than the 7th century BC in ancient China, not later than the 1st century AD in Greece.
8. Type of arrowhead used for war and hunting, medieval versions were made of steel with hardened edges. Has two to four sharp blades used to deliver a wide cutting edge to kill as quickly as possible through massive bleeding and causing further trauma on removal.
9. Container for holding arrows or bolts.
11. Artisan who makes bows by hand. First used between 1150-1200 in Middle English, spelled "bogiere", "bouwyer", "bouer", and "bowyere".
12. Also called a quarrel, an arrow-like projectile fired from a crossbow.
